## Key Vocabulary

### Key Vocabulary:

<b>Air raid:</b> An attack by planes dropping bombs.
<b>Air raid shelter:</b> A building to protect people from bombs.
<b>Anderson Shelter:</b> A type of air raid shelter made of corrugated iron— usually at the end of the garden.
<b>Atomic bomb:</b> Weapon first used in 1945 when two bombs were dropped on Japan, killing more than 100,000 people.
<b>Black out:</b> System of ensuring no lights were visible after dark so that buildings could not be spotted by enemy planes.
<b>The Blitz:</b> Series of bombing raids on the UK.
<b>Evacuation:</b> Organised movement of children and the vulnerable from towns and cities to safe zones.
<b>Evacuee:</b> Someone who was evacuated, moved from a danger area to a safer place.
<b>Gas mask:</b> Face mask to protect people against poison gas.
<b>Holocaust:</b> Mass murder of Jews and other groups of people by the Nazis.
<b>Morrison Shelter:</b> A type of air raid shelter made from a metal cage used inside the house – could double as a kitchen table.
<b>Nazi:</b> Member of the German political party which came to power in 1933.
<b>Propaganda:</b> Controlling news media (such as radio) to show your side in the best way.
<b>Rationing:</b> The controlled distribution of scarce resources such as food.
