AIM

To enable children, staff and visitors to St. Leo's and Southmead Catholic Primary School Serving the Community, to have the opportunity to take part in Collective Worship and have time to reflect. To enable and encourage a sense of belonging.

OBJECTIVES

The children will:

Become aware of reflection and the need for a calm reflective atmosphere. To develop a valuable skill for life.

Develop their own skills of prayer both in thought and aloud.

Be encouraged to create personal prayers and join in with traditional prayers. Appreciate that we are coming together to pray, to worship and respect each other's needs.

Experience prayer being related to life and living.

Experience the appropriate way to pray when collectively together.

Experience that prayer enables us to communicate with God by listening, speaking, reflecting and resting.

Experience the feeling of reassurance that prayer can provide.

<u>WHERE</u>

Collective Worship takes place in classrooms, the hall, the library, the outside classroom or school grounds, weather permitting.

WHEN

Collective Worship takes place each day for approximately five/ten minutes. It is timetabled but also has a flexibility to meet children's needs/worries as well as local/national issues. E.g. environmental disasters. The children are invited to pray or reflect or both.

FOCAL POINTS

Each teacher develops with the children an area of focus to look at when praying. Increasingly teachers are using I.C.T. as a resource for Collective Worship.

RESOURCES

Music, focal points, stories and children's prayers, Come and See Website, candles, 'God's Story', 'Church's Story', CAFOD pack, Jigsaw (PCSHE), Liverpool Archdiocese Website,

PLANNING

Collective Worship is planned in relation to the Collective Worship themes, current news, local, national and world issues, suggestions from all involved. The content of the Collective Worship is recorded on the 'Come and See' R.E. planning sheets.

<u>WHEN</u>

Collective Worship takes place each day.

ASSEMBLIES/CELEBRTIONS

We have one assembly each week during which the opportunity is taken to reflect upon the 'Come and see' topic and to celebrate children's Super Learning Powers. Each class has an end of topic celebration which other classes and parents are invited to attend.

GUIDELINES FOR COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

When — children are to be given the opportunity to take part in Collective Worship each day.

Where – Collective Worship can take place anywhere as long as the atmosphere created is appropriate. Sitting on the grass in a circle, on a sunny day may be

the perfect place at the right time. Sitting together on the carpet in the classroom, may be the right place another time. The important thing is to create a change from the what the children do for the rest of the day.

How — Always create an atmosphere which is calm. This can be achieved by the music, story, pictures and having a focal point. The simplest can sometimes be the best — a leaf, a photograph, a candle, or a song. Singing together.

Time – keep the time short and meaningful.

Planning – Always plan your Collective Worship before hand, choosing an appropriate prayer, theme and place. Be flexible to change if the children bring their own thoughts/ideas un expectantly Content – Vary the content, be selective.
